John 13.1-17

There arose also a contention among them, which of them was considered to be greatest.

He said to them, "The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them, and those who have authority over them are called 'benefactors.'

Jesus knew that the Father had given him complete power; he knew that he had come from God and was going to God.


John 13.4-5

So he rose from the table, took off his outer garment, and tied a towel around his waist. Then he poured some water into a washbasin and began to wash the disciples' feet and dry them with the towel around his waist.

He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Are you going to wash my feet, Lord?"

Jesus answered him, "You do not understand now what I am doing, but you will understand later."

Peter declared, "Never at any time will you wash my feet!" "If I do not wash your feet," Jesus answered, "you will no longer be my disciple."



Simon Peter answered, "Lord, do not wash only my feet, then! Wash my hands and head, too!"

John 13.10a

Jesus said, "Those who have taken a bath are completely clean and do not have to wash themselves, except for their feet."

If I do not wash your feet, you will no longer be my disciple. An Additional Interpretation St. Cyril of Alexandria & Bishop Gerasimos Papadapoulos

- Our entire being is cleansed in Holy Baptism and the sanctification of the Holy Spirit.
- Our feet needing to be washed refers to the sins we commit after baptism, which are cleansed in the mystery of confession.

John 13.10b-11

All of you are clean—all except one." (Jesus already knew who was going to betray him; that is why he said, "All of you, except one, are clean.")

After Jesus had washed their feet, he put his outer garment back on and returned to his place at the table. "Do you understand what I have just done to you?" he asked.

"You call me Teacher and Lord, and it is right that you do so, because that is what I am.

I, your Lord and Teacher, have just washed your feet. You, then, should wash one another's feet.

I have set an example for you, so that you will do just what I have done for you.

I am telling you the truth: no slaves are greater than their master, and no messengers are greater than the one who sent them.

Now that you know this truth, how happy* you will be if you put it into practice!



Philippians 2.3-4

Don't do anything from selfish ambition or from a cheap desire to boast, but be humble toward one another, always considering others better than yourselves. And look out for one another's interests, not just for your own.

Philippians 2.5-6

The attitude you should have is the one that Christ Jesus had: He always had the nature of God, but he did not think that by force he should try to remain equal with God.



Philippians 2.7

Instead of this, of his own free will he gave up all he had, and took the nature of a servant. He became like a human being and appeared in human likeness.

Philippians 2.8

He was humble and walked the path of obedience all the way to death— his death on the cross.

Philippians 2.9

For this reason God raised him to the highest place above and gave him the name that is greater than any other name.

Philippians 2.10-11

And so, in honor of the name of Jesus all beings in heaven, on earth, and in the world below will fall on their knees, and all will openly proclaim that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.
